Introduction

The Patutahi Township Development Plan (2008) captures the Patutahi community's long-term vision for Patutahi township. The Plan is a living document with the potential to evolve with the support of the community

Community engagement

The Gisborne District Council (GDC) wanted to draw on the knowledge and experience of the Patutahi community in preparing the Plan so several public engagement tools were used to encourage a range of people to take part in the process:

- open day
- strategic planning workshop
- ideas box at the Patutahi Tavern
- design workshop and community barbecue
- children's art competition
- an opportunity for written submissions.

Content of the Plan

The community has identified three Vision Statements that form the basis of the Township Development Plan:

- A cohesive and connected community.
- A community actively engaged in decision-making.
- A community growing active and healthy young people.

The Plan describes the Vision Statements in terms of Key Goals.

The community has also identified three Priority Projects for the township to be achieved over the next few years. All other ideas identified by the community are listed in Appendix 1.



Community commitment

This is an expression of the community's aspirations for the future and will need to be driven by a cohesive and concerted community effort.

Gisborne District Council commitment

The Plan will guide GDC in planning for the future development and viability of Patutahi over the next 20 years.

The Plan will be an important consideration in the development of Council's Long Term Council Community Plan (LTCCP) and will also be considered by all GDC staff where their activities may have an effect on the Patutahi community.

Appendix 2 is a table of GDC implementation estimates. For each priority project/action, it identifies if there is funding available in Council's Long Term Council Community Plan. It also identifies which department within Council is responsible for implementation. Where no funding is currently allocated, this will need to be considered for inclusion during future reviews of the LTCCP and Annual Plan.

Where GDC can work with the community and other agencies to meet the goals, it will.

A lot of ideas were submitted that are beyond the capability and mandate of GDC alone, for example, appropriate business and employment opportunities.

GDC will forward copies of the Plan to relevant agencies to encourage them to follow up in areas where they may be able to work with the community or other agencies to help achieve the community priorities.

Vision Statement

A cohesive and connected community

The Patutahi community is diverse. While the township has a population of 375, many people from other areas have historical and sporting connections to the community.

For the Patutahi community, a cohesive and connected community is one the whole community takes pride in and works toward. It would involve the following Key Goals:

Key Goals

- Ensure regular and varied opportunities and facilities for community members to meet.
- Create a town centre to serve as a social and recreational focal point for the community.
- Develop attractive streetscapes and well-maintained infrastructure.
- Foster growth of the township to improve access to important day-to-day services.
- Pursue opportunities to work together for a common purpose.



Priority Projects

Patutahi Town Centre

- Investigate how planning mechanisms could be used to foster growth of residential and commercial activity in appropriate areas within the township, noting that:
 - development retains the rural flavour of the town
 - development is focused around the town centre, not dispersed, to create a sense of community, improve personal safety and minimise infrastructure costs.
- Beautify the town centre by:
 - establishing a well-maintained public garden with native flora to attract birdlife and shaded seating
 - maintaining tidy roadsides and buildings
- Develop a strategy to encourage essential retail services back into the community

Vision Statement

A Community Actively Engaged in Decision-Making

For the Patutahi community being actively engaged in decision-making would involve the following Key Goals:

Key Goals

- Opportunities for early and meaningful input into significant decisions.
- Direct community participation in local decisions.
- Greater GDC Councillor and staff visibility and accountability.



Priority Project

Patutahi Committee

- Elect a community committee to improve social connections and organise community events:
 - events to include family days, sports competitions, dances etc.
 - committee members already nominated are John Drummond, Stephanie Jones, Danny Knight and Jandy Solomon
 - other committee members could include:
 - o someone from the Reserves Board;
 - o at least one youth representative;
 - o advisors from other agencies e.g. Sport Gisborne, GDC.
 - GDC can help the initial set-up of the committee and assist with funding applications and administration.
- Ensure ongoing dialogue between community and GDC Councillor and staff, including involvement in community meetings as appropriate.
- Committee to develop a charter at their first meeting to:
 - establish the purpose of the committee;
 - determine meeting frequency and who can attend; and
 - determine how the committee will contact other community members and GDC and vice versa.

Vision Statement

A Community Growing Active and Healthy Young People

For the Patutahi community, growing active and healthy young people would involve the following Key Goals:

Key Goals

- A variety of opportunities for local active recreation accessible to all young people.
- Young people with a voice in community decision-making.
- A safe town and access to health information and services.



Priority Project

Patutahi Hall

- Expand use of existing Patutahi Hall. This includes the use of the hall by younger community members for indoor sports (e.g. soccer, netball, basketball, volleyball and as a fitness centre) and activities (dancing, after school care and homework centre).
- Investigate 'best practice' for sustainability of the community hall. This may include developing relationships with additional organisation such as Sport Gisborne, SPARC and the YMCA.
- Seek funding to retrofit the hall to allow for indoor sports such as basketball and indoor soccer.
- Ask youth to design murals for exterior graffitiprone walls of the Hall to encourage youth ownership of the facility and reduce graffiti and property damage. Funding available through the Ministry of Justice.



Background Statistics

Population

- The population of Patutahi Township is 375 people.
- Patutahi has a relatively young population with more than a quarter aged 14 years or under.
- More than half (52.8%) identify themselves as Maori, while 40.8% identify as European.




Business and Employment

- There are a number of services and community facilities in Patutahi including sports clubs, play group, marae, Anglican church, fire brigade.
- There are no restaurants/food outlets although the Patutahi Tavern has food available on weekend evenings.
- The dairy/post office has recently closed, however, there is a centre where residents can collect their mail as there is no door-to-door delivery.
- There are several vineyards in the area.
- The main sectors of employment in the township are horticulture, agriculture and viticulture (increasing rapidly).
- Some residents work in Gisborne and commute daily.



Households

- There are 120 occupied dwellings in Patutahi Township.
- The majority of households are single family households.
- Nearly half of Patutahi households are couples with children, while around one third are couples with no children.
- Total household income is less than \$50,000 per year for around a third of households, while a further third have a total household income of between \$50,000 and \$100,000 per year.
- Less than half of all households have access to the internet.

Other ideas identified by community members

Vision Statement A cohesive and connected community

- Ask GDC to improve the entry sign into Patutahi town
- Attractive streetscapes and well-maintained infrastructure
- Attractive public gardens with shaded seating. Tidy buildings and roadsides
- Beautify the town centre with plantings of native flora, particularly those that attract birdlife. GDC to provide plantings and fund their establishment
- Develop a community notice board 'What's Happening in Patutahi' in the centre of town for the purpose of improving community communication and connections. To be managed by Patutahi Committee and maintained by GDC
- Develop the public toilet block and lobby Telecom to have a public telephone installed
- Develop a strategy to encourage essential retail services back into the community
- Erect a bus shelter outside the Patutahi Hall
- Excellent public amenities
- Excellent road infrastructure and drainage
- Increase overall street lighting in the town to appropriate levels (i.e. design not to interfere with 'dark sky')
- Install cameras to find perpetrators of graffiti and vandalism in the town and ensure those responsible for graffiti and vandalism play an active part in repairing damage



- Investigate opportunities for further appropriate retail development
- Investigate Patutahi as a 'dark sky' centre for astronomy. Other benefits include use of less electricity and therefore less CO2 emissions
- Investigate possibility for self-sustaining alternative electricity generation for town, including using sewage to generate electricity and using fuel cells to power some facilities e.g. the community hall, (may resolve electricity issues for Civil Defence). Consider funding from international organisations
- Investigate the viability of a 'family orientated' establishment overlooking the sports grounds
- Regular mowing of long grass on road verges and maintenance of drains

Vision Statement A community actively engaged in decision-making

- Encourage increased involvement in community meetings and decision-making through regular community discussion forums.
- Encourage local youth to be more involved in community activities
- Expand agency consultation methods to beyond newspaper advertising and post office box mail drops
- Improve community reporting of road and drainage issues to GDC (particularly via the Annual Plan process)
- Investigate various funding avenues for community assets, including lobbying GDC for increased financial assistance for maintenance of community assets



Vision Statement A community growing active and healthy young people

- A thriving school that focuses the community
- Community hall to be made available to all community members via a booking system. Users of the hall should contribute towards the cost of electricity and other usegenerated expenses. Exemptions to be made for youth and other activities at the discretion of the Patutahi Reserves Board
- Develop a 'computer library' or encourage 'Computers in Homes' programmes
- Develop a public swimming pool
- Develop links with Maori Wardens
- Develop the local school as a central focus for the community
- Expand the sports and recreation facilities available in the town (basketball hoop, skateboard park, children's playground, hockey training ground
- Give youth a voice in community decision-making and responsibility
- Improve existing sports and recreation facilities in the township including lighting, drainage of rugby fields, drainage of car parks, re-design of the hall car park to prevent skids and improve parking and resurfacing of court surfaces
- Investigate the viability of extending existing weekend Gisborne bus service to include Patutahi, particularly Friday and Saturday evenings
- Lobby District Health Board for a GP and community clinic for Patutahi and improve emergency services



- Divert large vehicles around town centre to provide safe walking and cycling
- Look to investigate the feasibility of reticulation as high water tables and septic systems are creating environmental and health concerns
- Operational details of the hall and other sport and recreation facilities (including improvements, bookings and use) to be handled by the Patutahi Reserves Board in close conjunction with the Patutahi Committee
- Support youth to develop regular community activities, with youth, for youth
- Young people with a voice in community planning and decision-making
